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Growing Through Gratitude

Thankfulness, studies show, has multiple physical, mental and emotional benefits. Psychologist Robert Emmons calls gratitude "fertilizer for the mind" because of its powerful effects.

He admits gratitude isn't always easy — especially when life throws us curveballs (see the year 2020) — but says it can be most helpful during and after difficulties. Emmons suggests reframing challenges using thankfulness-based language. Ask, for example: Though I wasn't grateful for the experience at the



time, how can I be now? What lessons did I learn, and how did I grow as a person?

Throughout his letters, the apostle Paul reframes his extensive sufferings and urges us to do the same. "Give thanks in all circumstances," he writes, "for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18, NIV).

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Strangers No More

Some people open their holiday meals to strangers, and one host even did so inadvertently. In 2016, Wanda Dench texted 17-year-old Jamal Hinton about Thanksgiving dinner, thinking she was contacting her grandson. When a skeptical Hinton requested a photo and received a selfie of someone with a different skin color, he chuckled — but then asked if he could still come eat! Thus began a new friendship and a new annual tradition, which Hinton documents online. "Family is more than blood," says Dench. "It's the people you want to be with."

Those that were able to attend worshipped physically together, with appropriate physical distancing. Beyond that we tested the waters with a trial indoor service. We needed to see how best to transition from an outdoor service to an indoor service, while keeping all of our church family safe.

As faithful people of God we have changed our way of gathering on Sundays, but gather we did, and we will continue to do so despite the current situation. Going forward we will adopt a new way, and it will look different than before, but no matter how things change, we are still here as a congregation.

Now that the colder months are upon us, a decision had to be made as to what our gatherings will look like. The

Council and I discussed the best way for the people of God to worship as safely as possible. This is what we decided:

For November only, we will worship outside on November 1, 8 and 15 at 10:30 am. On November 22, we will worship in the church at 10:30 am, if we have enough volunteers to serve and assist. November 29 will be a completely virtual service — no worship services will be held outside or inside on this date. Upon evaluating the indoor service on October 25, we found that many did not adhere to the guidelines we set — not arriving early enough to allow time to have temperature taken and complete the health form, singing the hymn. In order to continue to have indoor worship during this pandemic, it is imperative that we all follow the guidelines as laid out in my weekly letter prior to an indoor worship. We are trying to find a more creative way to gather as a congregation. If you have any suggestions, please contact me!

Siblings in Christ, I understand our decision will not satisfy everybody, and some of you may feel that your opinion was not heard. However, we have endeavored to do what is best during these difficult times. In the end, our purpose in being a church is to share the gospel of Jesus with the rest of the world, and we are always finding new ways to do it. Will it work? Will it not work? I do not know, but we will put our trust in God who will walk with us every step of our journey.
