This farming implement is mentioned frequently in the Bible, often in verses about the harvest. Plowing symbolizes preparing the heart to receive God's truth, or the "seed" of God's word. The plow also represents commitment; Jesus says, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62, NIV). The prophet Elisha burns his plow to show his commitment to answer God's call (see 1 Kings 19:21).

Indoor Worship Service on October 25th

On October 25, we will have our first indoor service since the beginning of March. In order to make an informed decision as to whether you will attend, here are the guidelines that we will follow for the health and well-being of all of us. Please arrive early to allow time.

- Remain in your car until you see an Usher outside the church door.
- Upon entering the church, your temperature will be taken and you will be asked to complete a health questionnaire.
- Based upon the mandated guidelines, we can only allow 25% capacity in the sanctuary. If we exceed that amount, you will be asked to proceed to the Family Room to listen to the service.
- Maintain 6 feet of distance from others

 exceptions are made if you are from the same family and living under the same roof.
- You must wear a mask over your mouth and nose at all times while in the church building.

- No singing or verbal responses —
 Pastor Hayley and the Lay Assistant will
 be the only ones doing this.
- The Restrooms will **not** be available for
- Windows will be open before and during the worship service to allow proper ventilation...dress accordingly.
- Only open your own pre-filled communion cups/wafers — do not assist others.
- Socializing is not permitted inside the building before and/or after worship.
- You will be given a brown paper bag to put your bulletin and communion trash in — please take your own trash home — it is not to be comingled with other worshippers.

Please adhere to the above guidelines. It is our way of living as faithful neighbors and fellow siblings in Christ where we care for our own and each other's lives.

Letter from Pastor Hayley

We live in a time where our country is divided more than ever. People are arguing and fighting over who is right and who is wrong. We are experiencing a division much like water and oil — two things that will never mix together. But in the midst of these differences, I'd like us to look for the similarity. I do see the similarity, which is the love we all have for this country. The way we each love this country may differ from the next person, but at the core, the love we share and the hope for a better future for this country is the same for all.

Divisions, arguments, and conflicts were also prevalent during Jesus' time. Ever since the existence of humanity there were conflicts. Remember Cain and Abel? How many others were there? Different races, cultures, languages, religions, economies, genders, and so on become the reason for conflicts and divisions. Even within the same family we may have different opinions and disagreements that cause divisions. That is reality.

So the question is...what do we do as Christians in the case of conflicts?

The first step to resolve any conflict is to do it one on one. If you genuinely want to resolve a conflict for peace, instead of gossiping, talk to that person, confront that person, not to start a fight, but to start reconciliation.

The second step is to bring in others who can mitigate the situation. If trying to resolve things one on one doesn't work, don't walk away from the relationship.

Jesus says to bring others with you who can help mediate.

The third step is to consider others as gentiles and tax collectors. What does that mean? If trying one on one doesn't work, and bringing in others to mediate the situation doesn't work, the Bible says to treat the others like gentiles and tax collectors. Does this mean to treat them like strangers? Probably not. The fact is that Jesus' ministry was meant to be with gentiles and tax collectors, as well as with sinners. So instead of labeling them as outcasts or sinners, we should remember we are God's own redeeming people who have our own flaws and sins.

So I ask you...who are you? Are you the one who treats others as gentiles and tax collectors, or are YOU one of the gentiles and tax collectors?

Ah...our own sin is that we judge others like tax collectors and gentiles, but we feel they have no right to judge us the same way. Right?

So who are we? We are people clothed in Christ. We put on the armor of light through our baptism. We seek peace in Christ.

As the Psalms say, "Teach us, oh Lord. Give us understanding, oh Lord. Lead us in the path of your commandments, oh Lord. Incline my heart to your decrees, oh Lord. Turn my eyes from beholding falsehood, oh Lord. By your righteousness enliven me."

Are we praying for people who disagree with us? We should be. Are we praying for reconciliation or looking for more division? Which way do you think we should go?


